The Rootes Group loyalists again congregated for the 5-year reunion known as SUNI. Due to Covid, it has been 6 years. This year's reunion was in Independence, Missouri. Just about the center of the county: 1200 miles from Tucson, 1200 miles from Florida and 1300 miles from Long Island NY. Dave and Sue Green and Jane and I made the trip to Independence. We took over a Sears's parking lot to park all the trailers – about 60 of them. A few brave souls drove their cars and a few hired Reliable to transport their cars and just flew in.


The organizers planned a full 5 days of activities. Drives to a Winery, (250 miles worth a little more than I wanted), tours of local Museums, and a visit to the WW I Museum. On Thursday and Friday, we enjoyed the concours and an autocross. All fun activities.

The highlight for me however was the evening talks. The first night was a talk by John Nikas, the same person who drove though Tucson a few years ago in an Austin Healey collecting signatures on the car for cancer victims. There is a picture on our web site of the car John was driving. He related a fascinating story of the British and their cars before and after WW II. Britain was close to bankrupt after the war and survived only by borrowing money from the US. The US at first would not loan the money because we were sending so much to rebuild Germany. After the second request and realizing the dire circumstances, it was agreed. Britain finally repaid that load in 2006.

Another evening speaker was Andy Bye from the Rootes Archives in England. In the last couple years with fund raising efforts, they have acquired their own building and plan to have it paid for by this November. All the Rootes drawings, ads, dealer documents and microfish drawings have been acquired and stored. They are in the process of scanning them all, quite an undertaking.

Another evening Mike Jones gave us a talk on the Jensen Assembly plant. Jensen was an independent contractor with an assembly plant that Rootes used. They assembled all the Tiger models. John worked at Jensen for Rootes as the liaison during the Tiger production years. He related a story of flipping one of the prototype cars on a test drive. Rootes was not happy. A destroyed prototype could easily set production back months. Another story was about the issue with the panhard bar mounted from the wrong side. He easily got one of the production people to correct it in an afternoon, but it took Rootes until 1967 to incorporate the change into production. He spent his career as an automotive engineer on both sides of the pond, an interesting guy.

Then there were the technical presentations from a wide variety of people. Everything from the changeover to LED bulbs to installing a 5-speed transmission. Again, really interesting stuff. All in all, a great week.
