The recent 60th year MGB celebration got me thinking about the MG enameled octagon badge we know today. I have found that the exact date of the 1st "badged" MG built seems to have been lost to time. Best I



can tell, is that between the first Morris car being modified and somewhere in the production of the MG Super Sports models starting in 1924 they became badged with a **round insignia** that stated it was an MG. When the flatnose radiator came in it generally carried a Morris badge or a Morris Garages variant of it. By the end of 1927 during full production at Edmond Road the final octagonal MG badge seems to have appeared and cars were badged with the MG octagon, as things were very fluid and evolving in the early days, many cars that already had the round badge would then be converted to the octagon badge when brought in for maintenance, so...exactly when was that date, ummm....? If any of our members have an idea when the 1st MG was correctly badged, please lend your pen to an article for the TBCR Register, as I for one would like to know the answer!

The Paint Match Dilemma

When I bought my MGA, I knew the paint was not a standard MG Color. The red attracts a lot of attention, except from many drivers on the road who still ignore the little car. I see a lot of law enforcement looking so I call it "Write Me Red". That is not a paint code.

When I got the car 7 years ago, I was given a can of paint, codes and 2 small touch-up paints. A few years ago, Earnie touched up a little using "Ferrari Red". Of course, when I wanted the paint to paint some trim and a new 3rd brake light it was nowhere to be found.

After some checking, I found that **KC Auto/WESCO** (201 E 27th St 520-624-8858) can do a camera shot and match the paint, and not expensive for a pint. When I got home with the newly matched paint, of course I found the original paint. Unlike *Karnac the Great's* answers in a mayonnaise jar, my old paint was sealed in a used plastic peanut butter container and left in an obscure area of my garage, not looking like paint at all. We must have looked at it a lot during the great paint searches.



The lost item is always found after it is replaced. At least we have a good Tucson source for matching paint for cars.
